Bits and Pieces of My Teaching Experience

<u>Create language environment from</u> <u>the textbook</u>: I edited the context of each lesson into rhymes for little kids, used smartphone to record and send them to parents for students to sing at home. Our class has a sheet for Chinese book borrowing records. My students can borrow Chinese books from me for reading at home.

Create dynamic language environment: My class has an activity called "Your Stage, You Decision!" Students can bring whatever they like most, being a toy, a book, or other thing. Each student has up to 5 minutes to describe his/her most beloved thing in Chinese. I usually arrange two to three students to do the activity in a class. All students will have their turns in a semester at least once. The selected student usually wears a paper-made crown, holds a microphone, and speaks in Chinese: they are the master on the stage. Please let your kids do the same kind of activity at home, so they can have more chance to speak Chinese.

Create homework for the parents too:

In my weekly communication e-mails, I have homework for the students and the parents. The parent's homework includes to tutor the students and to listen the students singing the songs learned in the classes.

<u>Create a suitable textbook, which is</u> <u>the most urgent and important thing</u> <u>for overseas Chinese teaching</u>: Most of the current Chinese textbooks have contexts that are too far away from the environment, the lifestyle, and the way of thinking that our kids are living in and with. No wonder they don't feel any affinity to the contexts in these textbooks, let alone to remember and retell any of them! The emphasis of teaching also needs re-thinking. For example, the radical "目" used in "眼睛 (eye)". We need to ensure the students know how to speak and use the words -眼睛, not the radical 目.
